## OUTREACH NEWS JANUARY 2018

The Outreach Team thank you for an implausible year of outreach to the community and globally to Africa University. All we have needed to meet the needs you provided. We have generous donors within the church, St. Johns Evangelical Lutheran Church (Aspen Hill Road), pre-school and neighbors that generously support our efforts.

We ended 2017 on a snowy morning that brought 57 families to the food pantry and many children to St. Nichola Secret Shop. There were heirlooms, beautiful new items and white elephants that made decisions very difficult for the little ones. Special thanks are extended to Janet Coffelt, Helen Doman, Patricia Dougherty, Barbara Lo and Carol Russell for wrapping. We are concluding the Angel Tree as the news-

letter goes to press. I was thinking because there were many angels that were not taken that maybe we just can't do this again when our angels appeared with substantial donations that allowed us to provide gifts for 64 children; 20 Wheaton Woods Elementary (Linkages), 24 for Parkland Middle School Linkages program and 20 for the church community.

Nancy Gray and the Smart Sack Team packed 51 bags per week for December-January, a total of 216 bags for Wheaton Woods Elementary School.

Community Partners under the leadership of Marguerite Eimer has plans for a MLK Service Event at Millian Church, January 15 from 1:00 to 3:00 pm in Fellowship Hall. The outreach will be extended to homeless shelters, service workers,

rest homes, and at-risk children. There is a need for items for the following items for the personal hygiene kits: tooth brushes, tooth paste (travel size), pocket combs, band aids, emery bags, wet wipes and chap stick. A box will be placed in the Narthex the first two weeks of January. Thank you for your cooperation. Please join us for this annual event.

## METHODIST SUPPORT FOR PALESTINE

One way, we as United Methodists, can better understand the Israeli/Palestinian conflict is by visiting the Holy Land and hearing both sides of the issue. Normally, most Holy Land trips are conducted to minimize exposure to Palestine and the Palestinian people and to concentrate on biblical locations within Israel. The United Methodist Church, as a partner to the 2009 Kairos Response document, actively sponsors trips to the Holy Land to broaden the conversation and to make visitors aware of what over 50 years of brutal Israeli occupation has had on the Palestinians. To this extent, the UMC is sponsoring the following trips:

**Come, See and Listen Tour** (depart April 16, 2018 – return April 27, 2018)

You will visit many Christian holy sites. You will sail on the Sea of Galilee, renew baptism in the Jordan River, visit the ruins of Capernaum, tour the Separation Wall, visit Qumran the site of the discovery of the Dead Sea Scrolls, view the ancient city of Jerusalem from the Mount of Olives, walk the Via Dolorosa and much more.

You will also meet with Christian leaders who will speak about the impact that Israeli settlements and checkpoints have on the everyday Palestinian life. You will visit Wadi Foquin, a community development project supported by the UMC General Board of

Global Ministries, meet with staff of the Aida refugee camp and discuss human right issues with Dr. Mitri Raheb, pastor of the Bethlehem Lutheran Church.

Cost: \$1,750 - \$2,000 (depending on the size of the group). This cost does not include airfare, drinks at hotels and restaurants, all personal expenses and mandatory UMC travel insurance. This trip meets all United Methodist Holy Land Tour recommendations.

**A Pilgrimage of Discovery Tour** (depart April 30, 2018 – return May 9, 2018)

This is an all-inclusive tour lasting 10 days. You will visit the Sea of Galilee, Nazareth/Haifa, Nablus and Jericho, Jerusalem, Hebron, Bethlehem and Wadi Foquin, and the Dead Sea. Details can be found at [https://www.kairosresponse.org/umc\\_tours.html](https://www.kairosresponse.org/umc_tours.html).

The tour includes round trip air fare from Dulles, DC, three night's accommodations in Nazareth, five night's accommodations in Bethlehem, nine days sightseeing in modern AC private bus, entrance fees to places of interest, one special dinner with families, honorariums to speakers and lunches.

Cost: \$3300. The cost does not include drinks at hotels and restaurants, all personal expenses and travel insurance. This trip meets all United Methodist Holy Land Tour recommendations.

**Olive Tree Planting** – A program for civil international solidarity with Pales-

tinians (start February 3, 2018 – end February 12, 2018)

This is not a tour, but a chance to meet, help and live with Palestinians in the Occupied West Bank Territory near Bethlehem. The program is sponsored by the Alternative Tourism Group (ATG) and the Joint Advocacy Initiative (JAI) – with The East Jerusalem YMCA -YWCA of Palestine. The program's two main goals are 1) to provide international presence to farmers who face constant harassment from settlers who disrupt and destroy their olive trees, and 2) to expose the international community to the harsh realities of living in an occupied territory under Israeli military rule.

The olive tree planting is a physical experience. It may be difficult for some due to the need to walk to the fields, dig holes and plant the new olive trees. There is also considerable walking on the various field trips. The program includes a guided tour of Bethlehem, visit to East Jerusalem and a tour of the Old City, one free day to travel or rest, a full day travel to Hebron with visits to the Old City, Ibrahim Mosque and a glass factory, and 3 ½ days of tree planting. This is a wonderful chance to meet the local Palestinian farmers and to share a field lunch with them. If desired, you can also lodge with a Palestinian family during your stay in

From page 5 Palestine. And since this is an international event, you will meet many other like-minded individuals from around the world.  
 Cost: \$700. This cost does not include airfare, drinks at hotels and restaurants, all personal expensed and travel insurance.

While this trip is not sponsored by the United Methodist Church, it meets the UMC's Holy Land Tour recommendations. Additional information can be found at <http://www.jai-pal.org/en/>. Please contact James Doman if you would like to

### SENIORS NEWS


The Millian Seniors met twice in November and twice in December. Our second meeting in November was our annual Thanksgiving luncheon in Thurmout. We had 30 attendees,

### Beyond a Merry Christmas *A Christmas Message from Bishop LaTrelle Easterling*

The debate rages on as to whether those who take their faith seriously must stand guard against the words “Happy Holidays” to preserve the more traditional greeting, “Merry Christmas.” The semantics have become the subject of many a sermon, conversation, article, and even political debate. The depth of one’s commitment to Christianity is being analyzed and assessed by this litmus test. The struggle has become so entrenched that it actually has a name, “The War on Christmas.”

And yet, as happens with so many of the rituals we practice, the words attendant to them have become rote, staid, and devoid of passion. When we glibly say, “Merry Christmas” to one another as reflexively as we say, “Bless you” after a sneeze, are we really embodying the deep existential power of a savior, coming in human flesh to dwell among us? Are we even thinking about the miracle of our Creator God being made manifest in human form to bring glad tidings? Or have the words simply become a façade for hearts that no longer ponder the mystery and majesty of the Incarnation?

Howard Thurman wrestled with whether God is the object or subject of our worship in Jesus and The Disinherited. This season, I wonder whether Christ is the object or subject of our experience of Christmas. If Christ is merely the object, then we are satisfied with Christmas as the culmination of endless parties, cultural carols, wallet-emptying and soul-frenzying shopping, gifts, and carefully placed decorations.

However, if Christ is the subject of our Christmas, our souls are not satisfied until we have personally experienced again the profound meaning of a child born into the world to dismantle systemic oppression and reveal entrenched evil. As the subject of our Christmas, Jesus is a gift of liberation, light, and love offered by a Mother/Father Creator concerned about the humanity and the salvation of every soul.

Therefore beloved, I do not wish you a Merry Christmas this year. Rather, I wish you a Christ-

mas full of wrestling with 65 million people who are displaced and dispossessed of a secure dwelling; I wish you a Christmas full of examining the prevalence of hatred culminating in gun violence; I wish you a Christmas full of pondering why the purchase of another human being is still an acceptable transaction; I wish you a Christmas full of weeping over the prison industrial complex that houses over 2 million persons; I wish you a Christmas full of rejecting the notion that human beings exist on a continuum of acceptability based on man-made categories; I wish you a Christmas full of proclamation against racism, sexism, xenophobia, homophobia, bias, ableism, and every other form of violence against humanity.

This Christmas, may Christ be made manifest in the flesh through our acts of solidarity with the suffering and against the empire of corruption.

I wish you all these things, and a heart that breaks and knows the fullness of God’s transforming love.

O come, O come Emmanuel, and ransom captive Israel from the stupor of a disembodied Merry Christmas.


